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THE BLACK FLAG IN BILLINGS. Citizens' Alliance No. 3 of Montana, which is located at Billings, has declared war on organized labor in that town.

The cause of the trouble is the workers of Billings want an eight-hour day, and the men that live on the sweat of other men's brows consider that nine hours is a short enough work day. It is hard to tell at this time receiving strong support from their fellow workers around the state, as several local labor councils have taken a vigorous stand to oppose the piratical methods of the Alliance.

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The militia company was organized in Billings a year ago, at the request of Paul McCormick, a prominent member of the Citizens' Alliance, and the officers of the company are either members of the Alliance or its henchmen.

A peculiar political significance is attached to the make-up of the Alliance in Billings. Every prominent republican is active in the Alliance in trying to break up the labor unions. In Colorado it was the republican party that did the dirty work for the Mine. owners' association and over-rode the law,

In Idaho the success of the republican party this fall is based on the successful prosecution of the officials of the Western Federation of Miners.

In Billings we find Paul McCormick, who headed the list of Roosevelt electors in this state; Goddard, a wheelhorse of the republican party in Montana; Bever, White, Prudhomme and Sylvester were all republican candidates for county offices at the last election; all active in the Alliance.

The democrats are just as deep in the Alliance schemes as the republicans-as deep in the mud as the others are in the mire. W. M. Johnson, leader of the democrat party in Yellowstone county, is as bloodthirsty and active against the union men as Paul McCormick or P. B. Moss.
