### ..... From One Who Knows

#### M'MECHEN, W. Va., July 14, 1904.

It was with great regret that I read No. 203 of "The Socialist." I had not the least idea that the need of the paper was so pressing. But regrets "butter no parsnips." It takes good hard cash to pay "The Socialist's" debts and put it on its feet. To that end I enclose twenty-five dollars to pay in advance for fifty subscription cards to the paper.

No man has a better chance than a field worker like myself to judge of a paper's value to the cause. Wherever in the past fifteen months I have found the comrades generally taking "The Seattle Socialist" there I have found a strong, active Socialist movement. There was no need of explaining to the local the meaning of "Revolu-tionary Working Class Socialism," "Wage Slave," "Class Struggles," "Class Consciousness," "Surplus Value," etc., etc. People who read regularly a paper like "The Socialist" are clear as to the principles, purposes, terms and tactics of scientific Socialism. In such a paper the field worker recognizes his strongest ally.

Knowing the splendid work done by "The Socialist" for the cause of Socialism; remembering that its editor, Comrade H. F. Titus, has toiled on for four years without a cent of salary, besides putting into the paper considerable money of his own, and that, too, without being the paper's owner; recalling other comrades, Olsen, Burgess, Herrmann and others, who have toiled for a bare living to keep the paper alive, with no word of complaint from them, no talk of sacrifice; I must say to let such work and sacrifice result in failure, to let such a paper die at any time, would be a' crying shame, much more so in the midst of a presidential campaign when every fighting factor of the cause is so badly needed.

The cause of Socialism is not alone the cause of those who toll and sacrifice to keep the party papers alive. It is OUR CAUSE. Let us be sure that we do our share of the fighting, brar OUR SHARE of the burdens.

Many a subscriber for "The Socialist" can afford to pay in advance for fifty subscription cards, knowing that all he has to do to get his money back is to sell the cards. Many others can afford to advance the money for a smaller number, forty, thirty, twenty, ten. I doubt if there is one subscriber who cannot get one yearly subscriber within the next week and send in fifty cents. I doubt, too, if there is a dozen subscribers who cannot send in one yearly subscriber, if they have to pay for it out of their own pockets. See what that would mean to the paper. One subscriber for each would mean a fund of not less than \$2,500. We can make that fund \$5,000 within the next ten days without finally being out a cent. Are the working people blind that they cannot see they are being sold and exploited by the RASCALS they vote for? Can any one point to a single honest government Republican or Democrat in any part of the whole country, North or South? The Grafter is everywhere, placed there by the fool ballots of the working ass. The question arises:

WHAT CAN WE DO TO BE SAVED: Keep on voting for the RASCALS, the old parties, and get bullets for ballots, as is now being done in Colorado, and with the full sanction of President Rough Rider Roosevelt and his able assistant, Major Bully Bell, also a Rough Rider and friend of Roosevelt. At present they are both engaged in riding rough shod over the working people of Colorado and there is no telling when it will come YOUR TURN NEXT. We have seen the police ride over our own people in Detroit at Mayor Maybury's request on the Campus. He also denied Comrade Engel free speech on May 12th, 1904.
